### **Local Engagement Team Update**

First of all we would like to say a big thank you to all services who have been working in their local community over the last few months. We know this has been making a huge difference to the lives of deaf children, young people and their families during this time.

The full Local Engagement Team is now looking forward to working actively with CHSWGs to support local services and multi-agency working throughout the autumn term. We recognise the challenges that services face in responding and adapting to COVID 19. With this in mind, we recently shared an Action Plan template which we hope CHSWGs will find useful to provide a clear framework to support services and CHSWGs in their continuing work.

The Local Engagement team will continue to monitor the impacts of COVID on deaf children's support, to share examples of positive practice and signpost services to useful advice and support. In response, we will be sending out a briefing in the next few days which reports on provision during lockdown and understanding the impact of COVID as some restrictions change.

#### **Returning to school**

We've worked with the British Association of Teachers of the Deaf and the National Sensory Impairment Partnership to develop guidance for professionals on issues to consider in any risk assessments around the return to school and colleges postlockdown. 

On 28 September, we will be sending out an FOI to all Local Authorities in England to ascertain any impact COVID-19 has had upon the education service for deaf children in your local authorities. We will be seeking information to determine any relevant changes to the staffing, provision and budgets in the area.

Social Care	Are You Ok?  We have been acutely aware of the likely impact Covid-19 has had on deaf children and young people and their families' emotional health and well-being, and where possible we have raised our concerns through formal responses to government consultations. In August, in co-production with Deaf CAMHS we launched an online survey, <a href="Are You Ok">Are You Ok</a> ? to gather the views of deaf young people during lockdown. We hope this survey can provide important evidence to campaign for policy makers and service providers to ensure they consider the impact of Covid-19 on deaf children and young people and their families when considering the support they may need.

#### **Technology**

#### Borrow to Buy scheme re-opened

Through the <u>Borrow to Buy scheme</u> service families can borrow Phonak radio aids, streamers and soundfield systems for up to 60 days. At the end of the 60 day loan period, they can choose to buy the product or simply return it to us. The <u>Borrow to Buy scheme</u> will run as it did before, but with two small changes:

- We have updated our terms and conditions to ask that both a family and their supporting professional <u>review the manufacturer's cleaning guidance</u> before applying. This will make sure that the products are properly sanitised with cleaning solutions that won't invalidate a product's warranty.
- 2. We will be sending a packet of cleaning wipes with every loan to help people get started, and to make sure that radio aids can be used as soon as they are delivered.

#### Consortium for Research into Deaf Education (CRIDE) reports

The <u>2019 reports from the annual CRIDE surveys</u> of services are now out, setting out the latest figures on numbers of deaf children and specialist staff.

#### **Pragmatics research**

We've funded the University of Manchester to carry out research to help develop new resources around the pragmatic and social communication skills of deaf children. Input from Teachers of the Deaf and parents is needed to help shape this research. Read more about it <a href="here">here</a>.

#### We are READY! (And we've made some changes!)

You will have heard about our exciting READY research – Recording Emerging Adulthood in Deaf Youth. This is a longitudinal study being conducted by the University of Manchester and University of Edinburgh, aiming to help us better understand how to support positive outcomes for deaf young people as they become adults. We've extended the recruitment timeline for this research, with the aim of recruiting at least 300 participants. We've also widened the eligibility criteria on age. To sign up, a young person must a) have a permanent hearing loss, b) live in England, Scotland or Wales and c) must be aged 15-19. (If 15, they must be 16 before the end of June 2021.) In addition, COVID-19 will have an impact on our cohort and we can possibly expect very different results in some measures due to this – to address that, only data from before

12 March 2020 will be used in our first wave report and in future reports we will be able to look at any patterns linked to COVID-19.

READY has the potential to be ground-breaking and to provide vital information on how we can all best support deaf young people to transition through to adulthood. The findings from the year one report, will be shared over the coming months. The continuation of this important research rests on the recruitment and retention of deaf young people into the study, so please signpost any young people you know to <u>find</u> <u>out more</u> and to <u>sign up</u>.
