What is an intervenor?

MSI impacts a child's access to both auditory and visual information. The process of intervention bridges this access through a professional called an intervenor.



What do intervenors do?

Children with MSI will have difficulty with learning through watching, listening and exploration. They may not have enough information from the world around them to understand what is going on, what they are missing or even how to form successful relationships.

An intervenor therefore has many roles which can include:

- ❖ Keeping the child safe
- ❖ Providing security
- ❖ Ensuring access to environmental information
- ❖ Promoting communication
- ❖ Supporting friendships



Who can be an intervenor?

An intervenor is a specialist teaching assistant who has received training in the field of multisensory impairment (MSI). This can be accessed from a range of providers. See your child's Qualified Teacher for MSI for further information on this.
